Thoughts from Pastor Amy

Your word is a lamp before my feet and a light for my journey. - Psalm 119:105

At that time the kingdom of heaven will be like ten young bridesmaids who took their lamps and went out to meet the groom. Now five were wise and five were foolish. The wise ones took their lamps and also brought containers of oil...the foolish bridesmaids said to the wise ones, "Give us some of your oil, because our lamps have gone out."

I have been praying fiercely for my clergy friends who are moving this year. Any other year, moving is a nightmare for clergy, even though it also holds hope and anticipation. I am thankful to be spending another year here in a place I love without the agony of packing and unpacking, without the fear of meeting new parishioners who all look like a masked stranger or a face on Zoom. I am thankful that we are not going through the fears and heartache of leaving behind the people we have spent years loving this year or jumping into a community we do not yet understand in a time when distance makes listening to the community almost impossible. But for my colleagues this year especially, I pray and ask you to do the same. It is a difficult year to move to a new place. And this is the worst week.

The week of July 4 is always the worst in a new parish because it is the toe-stubbing week. It's the week when even though we know we are home, we still wake up in the middle of the night and turn in the wrong direction to get to the bathroom, stub our toes on the dresser's new location, and wake up everyone in the house with our screams. When we move, it happens to each of us on differing nights, so it is also the week of no sleep. When we are somewhere new, it is difficult to find our way in the dark. This is not just the story of those who are moving this year, though; it is the story of us all trying to navigate through this new time of COVID. It is not our first week here, but we still wake up in the night walking in the wrong direction.

The program I use for my fitness tracker keeps track of daily habits. One of the questions is, "Did you park far away today and walk?" I have to answer yes to that a lot lately because the first time I head to the door is the time I forget my mask and have to go back to the car to get it. Yes, I walk a lot through the parking lots these days! It is like going the wrong way to the bathroom in the middle of the night. I have been here a while. I should know what I am doing. When I am tired, though, I fall back into old habits. I start leaving my mask in the car. But friends, just as we cannot use the closet for the bathroom, we must go back for the mask. We must remember that even though we are tired, it is important to keep one another safe and to let God light our path. Someone said we can't do the ministry we did because it would be harder in this season of COVID. To that I say this: We do not stop doing ministry because it is hard. We don't stop worshipping because it is hard. We do not stop keeping people safe because it is hard. We do not stop loving our communities because it is hard. Just because it is dark doesn't mean finding our way is less important; in fact, it is more important than ever.

We are going to have a hymn sing at the park. It might be hot. It might mean dragging out a lawn chair. It might be different. But we do not stop doing ministry when it is hard. We are going to do a late summer meal. It will be all carry out or delivery. We will have to deliver more. We will have to hand out and organize curbside delivery which we have not done before. It might be different. But we do not stop doing ministry when it is hard. We are going to give away school supplies and clothes. It will all be curbside. We haven't done it that way before. It will be different. We will need to do more organizing ahead of time, different people doing different things, and it might be downright hard. But we don't stop doing ministry when it is hard. We are going to hold VBS. We will only have one age group each night and we will have adults move while kids stay in place. Some might be outside or in a strange place in the building to allow for it.

We will have to clean well every night. It will be different. But we do not stop doing ministry when it is hard. We are United Methodists. Maybe the Conference falls apart. Maybe the denomination falls apart. Maybe COVID makes things almost impossible. Yet we persist, because we do not stop doing ministry just because it is hard.

We do hard ministry because without it, everything would be hard. Without Jesus in our lives and world, it would all be downright impossible. And we are the ones who bring that to our community. We must persist! We must be stubborn! We must push on in whatever ways we can so that the community has a lamp before their feet and a light for their journey. This year, we are all somewhere different groping in the dark. May our lamps be full and ready because it will be a long time until dawn.

Tell Me the Stories of Jesus: The Summer of Our Savior

Feel free to pack snacks and drinks, but be sure to keep the park looking beautiful by carrying out what you bring in! Be ready to sing some of our favorite songs that tell the story of Jesus so that the whole park can hear!

The four Priority Issues for 2016-2020 selected by United Methodist Women are Economic Inequality, Climate Justice, Maternal and Child Health, and Criminalization of Communities of Color and Mass Incarceration. Copies of news releases, recorded IPOD discussion through Faith Talks, and a list of books on these and other subjects through the Reading Program are all available at unitedmethodistwomen.org. Many of the books are available through the local library or can be purchased online. I can recommend So You Want to Talk About Race by Ijeoma Oluo. It's well written with real life events and explanations of concepts and phrases that can challenge one's thoughts. Notice I didn't say it's comfortable reading. I'm only half way through but I'm finding it helps me better understand the feelings and fears. I would be glad to share it. If anyone is interested let me know.
